It is important for all children to be in school as much as possible, in order to access learning. With the run up to SATs, can you try to ensure that all Year 6 children are in school and if possible, attend the SATs club on Tuesday.

Free School Meals?

With family circumstances changing all the time, please check regularly to see if you are entitled to Free School Meals.

Even if your child is in Reception, Year 1 & 2 and entitled to Universal Free School Meals, you are still able to able to apply for Free School Meals and can still benefit.

There is a link below to click on (or paste it into your browser) which explains the criteria for receiving free school meals. Also on the same page there is a link to make the application. This is usually a very quick process and schools know within a few days of new entitlements.

This could potentially save you as a family approximately £50 per month on school lunches if you qualify.

Rules

In a primary school, all rules are important as they serve different purposes. However, the significance of each rule can vary based on its intent and impact.

- Safety and Wellbeing: Rules are put in place primarily for the safety and wellbeing of pupils. For instance, playground rules ensure physical safety during play.
- Fair Treatment: Rules ensure that everyone is treated fairly. They prevent bias and favouritism, creating an environment where every pupil has an equal opportunity. Remember fair doesn't mean everyone getting the same, it means everyone getting what they need.
- Order and Discipline: Rules bring order and discipline to the school. They help manage the behaviour of pupils, promoting a conducive learning environment as pupils develop self-regulation.
- Learning and Development: Certain rules are designed to facilitate learning and development. For example, rules about participating in class activities encourage academic growth.
- Respect and Responsibility: Rules teach pupils about respect and responsibility. They learn to respect others' rights and understand their responsibilities towards their peers and the school.

While all rules contribute to a positive school environment, the consequences for breaking them may vary, making some seem more "important" than others.

However, it's crucial for pupils to understand and follow all rules for the overall functioning of the school and their personal growth.

Safeguarding

Safeguarding is, primarily, all about making sure children are safe, well and happy at school.

Here's why it's so important:

Keeping Pupils Safe: Safeguarding protects our children from harm like bullying or abuse. Schools have a duty to make sure the school environment is safe, and they have rules in place to stop bad things from happening. This lets our children learn without being scared or anxious.

Helping Children Who Need Extra Support: Some children might have extra challenges because of special needs, mental health issues, or tough situations at home. Safeguarding means schools look out for these children and give them the help they need.

Looking After Staff and Visitors: Safeguarding isn't just for children. It's also about making sure school staff are safe and that visitors don't pose any risks. There are clear rules to help everyone spot and report any concerns.

Creating a Safe Place: Safeguarding also involves making sure the school buildings and grounds are safe, and that there are plans in place for emergencies. This helps everyone at school know what to do if something unexpected happens.

In short, safeguarding is a promise to create a secure and caring school environment for everyone. This will always be a work of constant improvement, constant refinement.
